authority, the Principal of the institution, holds meetings with the teaching staff and receives inputs at the beginning of a new session. Each and every department puts proposals in the meeting pertaining to teachinglearning and evaluation issues. Suggestions are also received and these are placed in the Governing Body (GB) for necessary approval and further actions thereof. Each department enjoys full autonomy in designing class allotment as per central routine, courses to be transacted to design students' assignments, seminar presentations etc. As a tool for the enrichment of the curriculum, the respective departments organizegroup discussions, and student centric seminar presentations. To keep abreast with new areas of development in respective fields, the faculty members attend in various workshops, seminars, Refresher Course, Orientation Course, short term courses organizedby various universities. To keep informed about the crucial issues, the college has established Women's Study and Development Cell, Grievance Redressal Cell and Red Ribbon Club. The institute has a practice of collecting feedback and followup actions aretaken up on the basis of the inputs provided by the students. The curriculum of the B.A. Programme is designed by the affiliating University of Dibrugarh. Till introduction of Semester System there was three year degree course. Senior teachers and the librarian of the college are members of different committees. As the college imparts education in Arts faculty, we have very limited option for cooperation and collaboration with research bodies. Besides the regular undergraduate courses, the college is running higher secondary courses as per Assam government's regulation and undergraduate courses under K.K. Handiqui State Open University. Curriculums for the courses are designed by the concerned council and Open University respectively. Since its inception the college has been aiming at all round development of the student community. The institute is providing opportunities to the students to take part in various cocurricular and

extracurricular activities. The college maintains transparency in admissionand students' profile. Students are admitted on the basis of merit. Some departments arrange written tests for offering Major courses. Academic calendar prepared by the college on the basis of university's academic calendar and personal interactions provide the necessary information to the stakeholders. The college is well represented by students from different socioeconomic and cultural backgrounds. The respective departments encourage the students to take part in seminar presentation, group discussion, project writing, taking part in different literary competitions etc. Personal interactions with the slow learners are taken up by the departments concerned. The faculty members are encouraged to take part in various faculty development programmes, seminars, conferences, workshops organized by institutes/universities. The departments have been provided computers and the internet facility is available centrally in the Administrative Block and the Library.

Feedback Obtained
